The first thing mentioned in 2 Samuel is the death of King Saul & his son, Jonathan.

You wouldn't think that David would care about the death of King Saul. You might even think that David would be glad. Saul tried to kill David several times & chased him all over Israel.

King Saul was God's anointed; he was God's choice at the time; he was in God's will & plan. David knew that.

3.	What happened in 2 Samuel 2:4?

The people at the ceremony for David publicly announced that David:


- a. Was blessed of the Lord (2:5)

- c. Buried King Saul properly as a state funeral (2:5)
- d. Would be repaid with kindness (2:6)
- e. His hands would be strengthened & successful (2:7)
- f. Israel anoints David King over them (2:7)

A rebellion takes place. Saul's son, Ishbosheth, becomes King of Israel (the green part of map).

David for now is King of Judah (the red part). The two parts of the nation fight each other. Other military leaders join David; King Ishbosheth is killed.

4.	What happened in 2 Samuel 5:3?	

Things are going well in David's reign; there are military victories; the people are turning to God. King David got a little too comfortable and a little lazy.

- b. His son, Absalom, killed his brother, Amnon (2 Samuel 13:23-29).
- c. His son, Absalom, rebels again his father (King David) (2 Samuel 15:13).
- d. King David has to flee the capital, Jerusalem (2 Samuel 15:13-14).
- e. His son, Absalom, is killed in battle (2 Samuel 18:15).
