Acts 22:1-5 - "Brothers & leaders (he spoke in the Hebrew language), I am indeed a Jew, born in Tarsus of Cilicia, but brought up in this city (Jerusalem) at the feet of Gamaliel, taught the strict Law of our Fathers. I persecuted this "Way" (the church of believers) by killing, binding, and imprisonment (both men and women) as authorized by the chief priests and the council of elders (Sanhedrin ). That is why I traveled to Damascus to bring back believers to be punished here in Jerusalem." Philippians 3:4-5 - "If anyone thinks they should be proud of themselves and have complete confidence in their own flesh, abilities, and background, it is more true of me. I was circumcised the 8<sup>th</sup> day in the Jewish faith of the tribe of Benjamin, a pharisee who believed he was right in supporting the government against the Christians."
