#### WITH LIMITED FACTS, HERE IS WHAT WE THINK WE KNOW:

- Onesimus knew he was a slave, and probably didn't like it.
- Onesimus knew, according to law, that his whole life until death would probably be as a slave.
- Onesimus' performance might have been "who once was unprofitable to you".
- Onesimus had probably heard of the Apostle Paul even though Paul never visited there.
- Onesimus knew that Philemon was a believer, especially since a church met on the property.
- Onesimus stole money so that he could travel to wherever he was going.
- Obviously, Onesimus' running away & meeting Paul was a mystery but God had His hand in it.

## NOW TO PAUL'S LETTER

Philemon 1:8-16 Now I want to ask a favor of you. I could demand it of you in the name of Christ because it is the right thing for you to do, but I love you and prefer just to ask you—I, Paul, an old man now, here in jail for the sake of Jesus Christ. <sup>10</sup> My plea is that you show kindness to my child Onesimus, whom I won to the Lord while here in my chains. <sup>11</sup> Onesimus (whose name means "Useful") hasn't been of much use to you in the past, but now he is going to be of real use to both of us. <sup>12</sup> I am sending him back to you, and with him comes my own heart.

<sup>13</sup> I really wanted to keep him here with me while I am in these chains for preaching the Good News, and you would have been helping me through him, <sup>14</sup> but I didn't want to do it without your consent. I didn't want you to be kind because you had to but because you wanted to. <sup>15</sup> Perhaps you could think of it this way: that he ran away from you for a little while so that now he can be yours forever, <sup>16</sup> no longer only a slave, but something much better—a beloved brother, especially to me. Now he will mean much more to you too, because he is not only a servant but also your brother in Christ.

### WAIT A MINUTE:

- Onesimus left his position as a slave without the permission of his master.
- Onesimus stole either money or merchandise to finance his trip.
- Philemon & Onesimus were both probably Jews, though some say they were Greeks.
- If Philemon was a non-Jew & did not follow the Jewish law, then treatment of run-away slaves was extremely severe; Paul would not have sent him back.
- Now that Philemon is a believer, his runaway slaves would be punished properly.
- Onesimus humiliated Philemon among his people & violated any trust they had.
